

💰 PARK FEES & PERMITS

The daily use fee is \$6 per Wyoming resident vehicle, or \$9 per non-resident vehicle, and is required to enter and use park areas and facilities. An annual daily use permit is available.

The camping fee is \$15 per Wyoming resident vehicle or \$25 per non-resident vehicle (includes daily use fee). An annual camping permit is also available for Wyoming residents.

✔️ PARK RULES

A complete list of park laws and regulations is available at kiosks and park headquarters.


- Keep vehicles on graveled areas. Don't park on the grass.
- No glass bottles, fireworks, or firewood with nails in the park.
- Keep your park clean. Put trash in its place, NOT in the fire rings or toilets.
- Quiet hours are 10 p.m. to 6 a.m. Generators off.
- Keep pets under control, and clean up after them.
- Obey signs, traffic barriers and speed limits.
- No discharging of firearms in park.
- Camping is permitted for a maximum of 14 days in a 30 day period.
- Put fires out with water not dirt.
- Fishing and boating are permitted subject to the regulations of the Wyoming Game and fish Commission.
- Park dumpsters are for park refuse only. Do not put fish and animal parts in dumpsters.

Seminole State Park is administered by the Division of State Parks, Historic Sites and Trails; Wyoming Department of State Parks and Cultural Resources.



👁️ THINGS TO DO AND SEE

The park and surrounding area offers Wyoming wildlife and recreation at its finest. Camping, boating, swimming, fishing, hiking, and ATV touring are all available within the immediate area. The sights and sounds of wildlife are best in and near Seminole State Park. Patient visitors can be rewarded with a variety of creatures: big horn sheep, elk, mule deer, antelope, coyote, mountain lion, bobcat, fox, martin, raccoon, skunk, jack rabbit and cottontail rabbit. Bird watchers may glimpse eagles or other birds of prey plus many types of waterfowl and migratory birds. Bring your binoculars, sit back or go for a hike and enjoy!

🐟 FISHING

Seminole Reservoir offers some great fishing for both trout and walleye. Both species inhabit the entire reservoir, though there are areas of greater concentration for each. State record walleye have been pulled from Seminole in years past. Good river fishing can be found a short drive from the park along the North Platte River from I-80 at Fort Fred Steele State Historic Site all the way to the Gray Reef Area below Alcova Dam. In between lies the famous "Miracle Mile," well-known for its blue ribbon fly fishing.



📍 LOCATION

Nestled up against the base of the Seminole Mountains at the North end of Seminole Reservoir lays one of Wyoming's true treasures, Seminole State Park. Located 35 miles north from Sinclair, Wyoming on Carbon County road 351, Seminole State Park is known for its wide open water, local attractions and friendly atmosphere.

🕒 HISTORY



The Seminole Mountains surrounding Seminole State Park were once the site for gold prospecting during the late 1800s. The name "Seminole" is commonly assumed to come from the Seminole tribe, but is an Americanized spelling of the French name Cimineau. Basil Cimineau Lajeunesse was a French trapper in the area in the 1800s. Seminole State Park, located on the northwest side of the reservoir, was established in 1965 through an agreement between the U.S. Bureau of Reclamation and the Wyoming Recreation Commission (predecessor to Wyoming State Parks and Historic Sites).
